How did you become the person you are today?

My late father and my grandfather are the ones I look up to every day. From them, I got my spirit, and I learned respect, motivation and kind-heartedness. When I was young, growing up in Albuquerque, I was bullied. My late dad told me—don't listen to them, just be who you are. I took that to heart. I got friends through how nice and kind I was and how respectful I was to people.

How did you get involved in ZYEP?

After high school, I wanted to be a wildland firefighter. I applied to join the firefighter camp crew with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and their crew leader said I had a bright future ahead. The

following week, we got an email saying that

the federal government ended funding for the program. There was no camp crew. I thought—what am I going to do? I had my heart set. I was going to put money aside so I could maybe get my own vehicle.

I saw an ad for summer internships. I applied, was accepted, and placed at ZYEP! ZYEP put me out there with kids during

Summer Camp. Honestly, it really built me up-as


a person and my skills around kids. ZYEP invited me to continue working with them, and it set me up to be a good mentor in the after school program.

I still want to be a wildland firefighter. But I am still young, and I still have a lot of opportunities to do before

I get to where I want to be. I'm just really glad that I took that summer job with ZYEP. I love the vibes of the team, and now I call ZYEP family.

Honestly, it's a rough road. There can be so much hate. So many people

are into drugs and alcohol, and I wish I could do something about it. We need a lot of people just uplifting one another. At ZYEP, it's positive and motivating. That's honestly what we need.
